As a part of our work on the Nova Scotia Cattle and Sheep Sector Climate Change Adaptation Strategy, we partnered with Perennia Food and Agriculture and the Sheep Producers Association of Nova Scotia on a well-attended pasture walk series this summer and fall across the province. Additionally, Geoff Larkin, Climate Change Adaptation Coordinator, participated in multiple Interactive Biodiversity Workshops throughout Nova Scotia with Trevor Davison, Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture and Shane Wood, Perennia Food and Agriculture, where various biodiversity tools and management considerations were discussed.

The Maritime Beef Council (MBC) hosted the Maritime Beef Conference November 8th-9th, at the Delta Beausejour in Moncton, NB, which many NSCP Board representatives attended. This sold-out event saw great producer support, focusing on the Healthy Cattle, Healthy Grass, Healthy Profit theme. Stay tuned to MBC's website and social media for information on upcoming events, such as the Atlantic Beef School modules occurring this winter.

NSCP Zone meetings will be held January 6th-10th, 2025, and we encourage all producers to attend. A reminder that members can attend any of the meetings but will only be able to vote (where applicable) in their Zone. ### **MARITIME BEEF COUNCIL UPDATE**

Recently, the Maritime Beef Council held the Maritime Beef Conference on November 7 & 8. We had 130 people in attendance and feedback thus far has been positive! Also, it was encouraging to see the demographics in the room shifting to a younger generation.



We went live with the Maritime Livestock Price Insurance Pilot Project back in June and continue to do some education around that piece. Calf and feeder indices in PEI and NB. NS had a last-minute regulation change that delayed their entry but they will be joining as soon as that is settled up. Head over to maritimebeef.ca and scroll down to sign up for the LPI newsletter that sends information out most Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. There will be no availability from December 13 to January 6; on January 7, the feeder (850 lb) index will resume, and on February 4, the calf (600 lb) index will resume in preparation for the 2025 calf run.



There will be 3 offerings of the Atlantic Beef School from January to March 2025. February 8 will be Cattle Handling Systems, featuring Reg Steward from BC; this session will be held in PEI. On March 15, we will host the Feeding & Nutrition module in Amherst, NS. The Leadership & Advocacy module will be available online by the end of February for you to complete at your own pace when convenient.

We also have plans on continuing feedlot club meetings, which will have happened in early December. The next round will happen in mid-March; there may be an additional date, depending on participant interest. The calf club had sold in some of the fall feeder sales at Atlantic Stockyards and recruiting for next year is ongoing. We have had 265 head selling in the Fall feeder sale run at Atlantic Stockyards. If anyone is interested in learning more about selling with this group, please reach out.

We also worked with some different beef organizations to work together on having a Beef Booth at the Farm Mechanization Show in order to promote some of the resources, and events that will be happening. The intention is to increase the visibility and reach hopefully, perhaps get some resources and information out to producers directly in a different way than we have before.

## **CLIMATE ADAPTATION LEADERSHIP PROGRAM UPDATE**

A dry and warm October has transitioned to a wet and cloudy fall. With summer in the rear view, and winter on the horizon it's time for producers to get ready for the next season.



Extending the grazing season is something that many producers in the Maritimes think only is practical in Western Canada due to colder weather and drier conditions. It is true that our climate is warmer and wetter, and this comes with a different set of challenges to face when it comes to grazing management, but it's not all bad. It's always important to play to the strengths of your operation. The Beef Cattle Research Council (BCRC) has a checklist for choosing an extended grazing system that works on your farm, available by scanning the QR code to the left. Regardless of the extended grazing system that is selected, good management and early planning is needed to keep livestock in good condition and healthy.

For anyone looking to "dip their toes in" stockpiled perennials are a good one to start with. In the first part of August, identify a field or pasture that would work to stockpile, with the goal of grazing when other pastures become dormant. Choose a field that has adequate water, fencing, fertility, and forage species that will hold their palatability and nutritional value later in the fall.

Another option for our climate could be bale grazing, or a hybrid of bale grazing into the fall. Identify an area of your field of pasture that is low in fertility, low in production or has some weed pressure. Instead of committing to it for an entire winter, try it for a month to see if it's a good fit in your operation. Flexibility is key when it comes to extended grazing management. Every year is going to be different, so always be prepared with a backup plan in case conditions are not favorable. When conditions are good again, you can continue with your original plan.

There is also excitement and growth in both the cattle and sheep sectors in Nova Scotia. The Maritime Beef Conference and the 4th Annual Sheep Industry Conference were held in November with record attendance at both. Excellent speakers combined with an interactive crowd allowed for great questions and sparked some detailed discussions. Anytime that producers become more efficient in their operations it makes them more resilient to climate change. If you were unable to attend these sessions, make plans to attend them next time!

Take some time this winter and complete the CALP Self Assessment tool found on the NSCP website and the SPANS website, under the Climate tab. It's a great time to take stock of how you are adapting to climate change on your operation. To help become familiar with CALP, this self-assessment outlines key areas relating to climate adaptation goals and practices. You will be assigned a score based on your answers for each section, and an overall score that you will be able to see instantly. The key areas that it outlines are Soil pH, Nutrient Management Planning, Forages Species Selection, Grazing Management, Forage Quality and Genetic Selection.
