MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

Spring has officially sprung across the province, and we have thankfully received warm, mild weather. As the Nova Scotia Cattle Producers prepare for a busy upcoming season, I hope this newsletter finds you and yours in good health.

Our Zone meetings were held in person again this past January. Attendance was down from recent years, with hopefully more producers attending in the future. If you have input of what you would like presented at future Zone Meetings, please reach out to the office! This year's meeting consisted of a business meeting followed by virtual presentations from Amy Higgins from the Maritime Beef Council, Ryder Lee from the Canadian Cattle Association, and Melinda German of the Canadian Beef Cattle Check-off Agency. Additionally, Jonathan Wort, from Perennia, presented on the cost of retaining heifers, as well as gave a Perennia update. Thank you to all who attended the meetings. We trust you found value in attending.

Our Annual General Meeting was held on March 2nd at the Salmon River Fire Hall. It was well attended, and after the business meeting, we featured a presentation from Jodie Griffin from Saskatchewan Crop Insurance, on livestock price insurance, followed by a roast beef dinner. We also awarded Brendan and Gerard MacKinnon of Margaree Harbour Resources Ltd. as the 2024 Cattle Producer of the Year. Congratulations to the MacKinnons!

Our collaboration on the Burger It Forward Campaign with Irving Big Stops, Dairy Farmers of Nova Scotia, and Canada Beef, last month was again a huge success! We assisted in the efforts, raising an estimated \$66,186 for food banks across the country. As a part of that effort, the NSCP donated \$4,000 worth of ground beef from Atlantic Beef Products to Feed Nova Scotia. Thank you to everyone that made this possible and supported Burger it Forward last month!

The Canadian Cattle Association has initiated an update to the National Farm Animal Care Council Code of Practice for the Care and Handling of Beef Cattle. The Code development process includes a survey, to capture welfare concerns from stakeholders. Input received will help the Code Committee understand the kinds of issues people wish to see considered in the update. The survey for this Code is available at: www.nfacc.ca/codes-of-practice/beef-cattle. This survey closes on May 3rd.

The Canadian Beef Check-Off Agency established a scholarship to encourage and support students pursuing post-secondary studies in the field of agriculture, agricultural research, or with an agriculture background pursuing studies in marketing. AVIAN INFLUENZA DETECTED IN DAIRY CATTLE

As you may have heard or seen in the media, in late-March, Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) was detected in dairy cattle in the US (Texas, Kansas and New Mexico).

We want to assure cattle producers there is no need to be alarmed, as to-date the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) has not detected HPAI in dairy cattle or other livestock in Canada. The CFIA are continuing to monitor the situation. The identification of HPAI in dairy cattle should not have implications for the international movement of milk, meat or live animals.

2024 PRODUCER OF THE YEAR: MARGAREE HARBOUR RESOURCES LTD.

Margaree Harbour Resources Ltd is a family farm that is owned and operated by Brendan and Gerard MacKinnon. It is located in Margaree Harbour on the western coast of Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia.

The farm is a cow/calf operation which has around 100 head of commercial beef cattle. The cow herd is a mainly Simmental based herd and uses 3 bulls. A Simmental bull is used as a maternal sire and 2 Charolais bulls are used as a terminal sire. Over the years, the MacKinnons have been a longtime supporter of the Maritime Beef Testing Society with most of their herd sires having been purchased through the Nappan Bull Sale.

The main calving season on the farm starts mid-November till January with the remaining cow herd calving in March – April. The calves born on the farm are marketed in the fall through Atlantic Stockyards in Truro where they have always performed exceptionally well.

The cattle are pastured at two community pastures in Cape Breton. The cow/calf group is pastured at the community pasture in Cheticamp and the replacement heifers at the community pasture in Mabou.

Brendan and Gerard are part of a non-profit society that operates the Cheticamp Island Community Pasture that is leased from the Nova Scotia Farm Loan Board. They also have been involved with the community pasture in Mabou and help out any way they can. The MacKinnons firmly believe that the community pastures in Nova Scotia are a valuable resource for the cattle industry and are an important asset to the rural communities where they are located.

The success of Margaree Harbour Resources Ltd over the years would not be possible without the continued support of our entire family; wives, kids, brothers, sisters, nieces and nephews. Everyone has a role in this successful operation.



TEST STATION - SALE SUMMARY

The 51st Annual Maritime Beef Testing Society Breeding Stock Sale was held as a hybrid auction again this year on April 6th, 2024. In total, there were 50 bulls offered, which averaged \$5,802. A heifer sale also occurred again this year, with 37 heifers offered, averaging \$3,114.

The top-selling bull was a Simmental, purchased by Ferme Germain Pineault Inc. for \$11,000, consigned by Trevor and Paula Hiltz. The top-selling heifer was a Cross, purchased by Sandy MacKenzie for \$4,600, consigned by Orchard Hill Farm.

 A funding program for sire purchases, genomic testing, and carcass ultrasound.

 Application Deadline: June 30, 2024, and February 15, 2025
- ➤ The Nova Scotia Soil, Pasture & Forage Management Program

 A funding program for lime purchases, and/or soil, manure and feed analyses.

 Application Deadline: June 30, 2024, and November 30, 2024

Environmental Stewardship and Climate Change Program

Application Deadline: June 30, 2024

This program supports the Agricultural sector in reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and adapting to the impacts of climate change, and helps primary producers accelerate the adoption of priority beneficial management practices.

Limestone Trucking Assistance Program

Application Deadline: September 30, 2024

This program aims to help Nova Scotia farms defray the cost of trucking limestone to give equal opportunity in neutralizing the soil's acidity on agricultural land and improve production efficiencies.

On-Farm Electrical Preparedness Program

Application Deadline: July 31, 2024

This program helps farms buy a backup generator and battery storage to support business continuity and preparedness for adverse weather.

On-Farm Water Management Program

Application Deadline: May 31, 2024

This program will support primary producers to improve and adapt to impacts of climate change on water implications, including activities to conserve and enhance natural resources for water management. This program helps primary producers accelerate the adoption of priority beneficial management practices.
